I have recently returned home from the Corriedale Family Social Day held at West Cloven Hills, home of Nick and Sue Cole.


The day was an outstanding success, attended by breed enthusiasts from South Australia and Tasmania, as well as the Western District of Victoria.

VALE – RUSSELL BAULCH

1927 - 2005



Late Russell Baulch, pictured here riding Small General - a winner of five races and many placings, and which has recently died at 34 years.

Russell Baulch, of Koonongal, near Hawkesdale, Vic., died at home on October 12.

His life long support of the A.C.A. and Corriedales was acknowledged by his recent appointment as Joint Patron and Life Member.

Sent to boarding school at Geelong aged eight he became Dux in 1945.

His keen eye for Corriedale stud sheep, Hereford cattle and thoroughbred horses complimented this scholarship throughout life.

Together with his wife Margaret, Koonongal was created from a bare paddock to become a unique home and garden where they could entertain friends. A feature of Russell's personality was his loyalty to his school, his friends and to Corriedales.

Members extend their sincere sympathy to Margaret, David, Andrew and Robyn and grandchildren.

Russell A. Baulch became the A.C.A.'s first Treasurer, leaving a healthy balance on retirement from this position in July 2004. His involvement with the jumper 'Gallywood' was the high point of a racing career.

Late Murray Willsmore

27.11.1924 - 12.09.2005

The Corriedale breed has lost a strong supporter in the passing of South Australian breeder, Murray Willsmore, on September 12, aged 80 years.

His involvement with Corriedales began in 1936, when his fathter started a Corriedale stud, flock number 502, with stock purchased from Mr. R.K. Vardon (F.348) and later from the estate of J.R. Moodie (F. 7, A.C.S.) and the estate of W.R. de la Poer Beresford (F.97) Inman Valley, S.A.

The stud was discontinued but the flock was run for many years as a pure Corriedale commercial enterprise by Murray and his father Stan, with strong support and help from Murray's wife Betty.

In 1975 Murray purchased registered Corriedales from H.L. Lush & Sons (F.106) and W.K. & D.K. Lush (F.1273), both from Inman Valley S.A., to form the Nammuldi Corriedale stud (F.2192). No long after that Murray became involved with the S.A. Corriedale Association and was a member of the S.A. Committee for many years.

Pure Corriedales were one of Murray's main interests and have proven themselves to be reliable and profitable over the sixty nine years of breeding and his involvement with the breed.

The Nammuldi Corriedale stud and pure Corriedale commercial flock will continue with his son Neil now continuing this family's interest in Corriedales.

Dubbo Show 2006

Corriedales began showing at Dubbo, NSW, in 1996 with about 16 sheep.

Next year Corriedales will be the feature breed and Tony Manchester has been promised support with 64 entries so far.

Dubbo is a fantastic venue for showing sheep and exhibitors are always made most welcome.


Corriedale Classic

The attendance of buyers at this year's 'Corriedale Classic' held at 'Stanbury', West Cloven Hills on October 6, was a little disappointing compared to the 2004 Corriedale Classic. The rams presented were of very good quality. Similar prices were attained to the sale held at Macarthur with prices ranging from \$400 -\$625.

175 two-year-old ewes from 'Stanbury Corriedales opened the sale and sold for \$80.00.

Corriedale Hills Ram Sale

The Lush family's annual sale of Corriedale rams on

October 4, saw 31 rams offered. These 15 month old rams were June shorn and in good order despite the adverse conditions of autumn and winter. All rams were presented with Stockscan figures for weight and eye muscle area (taken at 10 months of age), together with fleece weights and fibre diameter. The 'pick' ram had weight - 60.5kg, EMA -20.7cm2, GFW of 6.4kg and FD of 28.6 micron.

With several regular buyers away, the sale (offered under Helmsman auction) was quiet, with six buyers selecting 14 rams at an average price of \$370 and a top of \$500. Buyers came from Mt Gambier, Naracoorte, Ki-Ki, Melrose and locally.

Loddon Park and Mooralea Ram Sale

Loddon Park and Mooralea studs held their combined sale on October 5, at 'Mooralea', Macarthur.

A most successful sale, well attended with a good clearance rate.

Price ranged from \$350 -\$700. The top price range of \$675 - \$700 was paid for three separate lots.

Wagin Woolorama

Wayne Goater, Baindu, Narrogin, W.A. was the Corriedale judge at the 2005 Wagin Woolorama in March.

Corralyn gained the awards for champion ram, champion ewe, champion long wool ewe and won three classes.

Shade Park exhibited the reserve champion ram and ewe, were most successful exhibitor and won both groups and four classes.

The Inlet Views stud of Denmark Agricultural College, was winner of the ram class under 1 year, objectively and subjectively judged, and was the only exhibitor in the Corriedale Wool section where it gained the awards for ram fleece, ewe or wether fleece, and champion fleece.

SGA Launch Heralds New Opportunity For Corriedale Breeders

The Corriedale breed was well represented at the launch of the national sheep genetic database - Sheep Genetics Australia - held at the Adelaide Showgrounds recently. Craig Turner, Jim Gough, Wally Jenkin and Brenton Lush were among nearly 200 industry representatives who gathered to see Federal Agriculture Minister Peter McGauran launch what will be the world's biggest sheep genetics database.

SGA, through the cooperation of MLA and AWI, brings together the information of 1.2 million terminal breed sheep and 350,000 maternal sheep from the LAMBPLAN database. with that of over 1 million Merinos from Merino Genetic Services. Information from these animals is used to calculate Australian Sheep Breeding Values (ASBV's) for over 70 traits to help breeders determine which animals have the required genes that will help them improve their production.

The database was designed for ram breeders and commercial producers to compare the genetic potential of rams and ewes for a range of industry agreed traits, across flocks, independent of the environment and location.

Information for the database is supplied either directly by the breeder or through a Service Provider.

The breeder decides which traits are relevant to their production system, which measurements to take, how much information to put in and retains direct ownership of their stud's data. The collection of data is subject to Quality Assurance procedures to ensure its accuracy and credibility, and as a guide on how to select and measure different traits to maximize the accuracy of the breeding value.

There are two types of breeding values that can be calculated. ASBV's are the most accurate breeding values and are used to compare sheep within the same breed group and across flocks. These will be reported with an accompanying trait accuracy value, and will be presented in much the same way as the breeding values and accuracies in a **BREEDPLAN** beef cattle catalogue. In the Merino industry, studs with these ASBV's will be identified by a 'MERINOSELECT ASBV' logo, while in terminal, maternal and dual purpose breeds participating studs will be identified by a 'LAMBPLAN ASBV' logo.

The second type of breeding value that can be calculated is known as a Flock Breeding Value (FBV). These are calculated as estimates of performance within a particular flock or management group and are not used for across flock comparison. They can be used in studs which have no link sires to other studs or where the accuracy of the calculation is low. Accuracy estimates will not be reported with FBV's.

The launch of SGA gives Corriedale breeders a new opportunity to assess the role of performance recording within their studs and within the breed. With the involvement of Merino breeders in the database and being taught how to speak the language of ASBV's, it has the potential to broaden the client base for Corriedale rams. There will be more information about SGA, including costs and benefits, in the next newsletter.
