### FROM THE PRESIDENT



### Dubbo Show

The Corriedales were the Feature Breed and provided me with a splendid opportunity to meet a good proportion of New South Wales breeders and also to see an excellent line up of sheep exhibited by eight different studs. It also gave me the opportunity to renew old friendships as well as to make new acquaintances. Beulah Stud were not showing, which gave Alec and Jo Carroll time to show me around Dubbo and for me to enjoy their company. It was also delightful to enjoy Sandy Sullivan's (nee Prell) vivacious personality once again.

I met the Kemp family for the first time - Philip and Pam, Chris and Amanda, Tim and Anita. Although confined to a wheelchair, Philip's lively enthusiasm made him a pleasure to sit with during judging. Brian Adams and the boys from Lithgow High School presented a promising team to represent the newest Australian stud.

Neville Mangelsdorf, the Judge, and Matthew Brown, his Associate, worked together splendidly throughout a very full day of judging, as did Judy Manchester, who combined stewarding with recording results. Awards were well distributed among all exhibitors with Gundowringa winning Champion and Reserve with their two year old rams, Craig Turner's senior ewe gaining an exciting victory over Rick Hoolihan's superbly covered ewe hoggett - good to see Rick's enthusiasm rewarded. A wide variety of shearing dates made comparisons difficult; but I was hugely impressed by the general quality, particularly in view of appalling seasonal conditions. Tony Manchester's team performed consistently well the naturally long staple of the Roseville sheep, a sure indication of Neyliona blood, will be a great asset to our breed. Chris and Amanda (Merrigal) and Tim and Anita (Cuttabaloo) Kemp both exhibited teams of later shorn sheep displaying excellent bone and quality.

David Baker and St. Gregory's College produced a team representing ideal breed type Corriedales - their three senior ewes in particular impressed me with their spring of rib and covering. One especially interesting feature was the evenly good standard of young sheep sired by a ram Peter Baker has made available to a good number of newer breeders - this particular ram caught my eye as my personal choice of all the sheep I saw on the 2004 show circuit.

Whilst in Dubbo I enjoyed being able to attend the breed dinner at the Castlereagh Hotel, and also a well attended branch committee meeting. John and Geoff Lane came from Galore to join us for judging and the dinner. It was also a great pleasure to meet Mike Harvey of "The Land", whose knowledge of and enthusiasm for Corriedales is of the very highest standard.

### Campbell Town Show

The most recent Show I have attended was Campbell Town, where six exhibitors with seventy sheep (forty seven rams and twenty three ewes) provided the biggest entry of Corriedales seen for several years. Bruce Hamblin, with his decisiveness and communication skills, was the ideal person to judge

such a large number and he also gave excellent guidance to Sam Archer (Richard's nephew) as his Associate. Tom Burbury, once again doing an extremely satisfactory job as Steward, would have appreciated an assistant to record results on the whiteboard. John and Jan Savage dominated the major awards with a superbly presented team displaying the carcase quality the Judge was seeking. Probably the most satisfying features of the day were the reappearance of Don Dennis' Fairfield sheep in the showring and Patrick Taylor's richly deserved victory in the class for Best Head on a Corriedale Ram. For the second year in succession, a Corriedale won the Supreme Junior Wool Breed Ram award, this year's winner being a hogget of John Savage's which has already been used in the Gambier View stud.

## Late Percy J. Munro 09.07.1908 – 08.04.2006

Percy was born at Wando Vale an area north east of Casterton. Due to his father's illness he left school at 14, and took on the working horse team to sow the crops of barley and oats on their mixed farm. In 1936 he married Kath Colville, a high school teacher, and his father purchased Brecon for the newly married couple. His wife left teaching to help on the farm, which included milking the cowherd by hand.

Right from the start Percy took great pride in what he did, so it was only natural that he started a Corriedale and an Angus stud in 1953. Always an active and energetic community member he was awarded many life memberships, which included,

- Casterton P. & A. Society;
- Carapook Fire Brigade;
- Royal Automobile Club;
   and the
- Australian Corriedale Association

He was a foundation member and life member of both the Hamilton Wool & Craft Guild and the Hamilton Wood Turners Club. He was the inaugural President of the Western District sub-branch of the Australian Corriedale Association and afterwards acted as secretary for a number of years.

For his work in promoting Corriedales, and his involvement with the spinners and weavers, he was named Hamilton Wool Monarch at the Hamilton Sheepvention of 1987.

For his work with the Soil Conservation Authority, and the innovative work he did on Brecon, he was awarded the Hanslow Cup in 1960.

In the early sixties Percy was an advisor and mentor to the Casterton branch of the Victorian Young Farmers movement.

In August 1968 his wife died of leukaemia, and on New Year's Eve of the same year he broke his leg while stacking hay. The cause of the break was diagnosed as cancer and the leg was amputated. At this time he developed diabetes and so he was in and out of hospital for the next 12 months. A friend of his wife's, Alice Cartman, helped him through this period. He later married Alice and they soon retired to Hamilton where he took on new interests of woodturning, spinning and weaving, and developed a very productive veggie patch. The veggie patch was raised so that he could sit on the edge of it to weed and work the soil.

Percy is survived by two sisters Alma Donehue (Shirley Foster's mother); Lorna Kipping; two sons, Tom and Peter and two daughters Charlotte Davis and Carol Baudinette. Daughter Beth and son-inlaw David Jackson, daughterin-law Sue Munro and sonin-law Bill Davis all predeceased him. He had 14 grandchildren and 25 great grandchildren.

### Late Laurence C. Lush

Laurence C. (Laurie) Lush died on May 29, 2006 after a short illness. Throughout his entire life Laurie has been involved with stud Corriedale sheep.

When a school boy he would be assisting his father in tagging and lamb marking chores. As a young adult he contributed to the classing and mating of the then large Corriedale stud. In the late 1940s he was involved with the Dept of Agriculture in experiments evaluating the efficacy of drenches and trace elements in weaner sheep, and much later in progeny testing of rams to determine the indicators of heritability of coloured fibres in white wool.

Laurie was an astute classer and judge of Corriedales, always emphasising the commercial traits. He judged at most S.A. country shows, the Perth Royal Show, and hogget competitions. In his late 20s he was elected to the S.A. Branch of the Corriedale Assn, and after many years of service was made an honorary life member of that branch. In 1975 he attended the World Corriedale Conference in New Zealand.

Beginning at the Adelaide Royal Show in 1947 and continuing until very recent years, a period of nearly 50 years, Laurie was involved in exhibiting a large team of "Corriedale Hills" sheep at this Show, winning many prizes and championships.

Laurie was the co-principal of "Corriedale Hills" which conducted an annual sale from 1961 to 1990 – a period of 30 years. Up to 3000 Corriedales of all classes were sold to buyers from S.A., W.A. and Victoria. It was a feature of the Corriedale year in S.A.

Private selections of flock rams continued throughout the year with most yearly sales ranging from 200 to 400 rams. The best year was in 1966 when 587 rams were sold.

During the hey-day of the Corriedale breed in the 1970s, Laurie was the coprincipal of the "Corriedale Hills" stud which arguably could claim to have sold overseas more Corriedale sheep than any other Australian Corriedale stud.

Today stud Corriedale sheep continue to graze upon the hills surrounding his home, "Coomooloo", at Inman Valley.



### Corriedales Explore Trans-Tasman Genetic Evaluation

During Sheepvention 2005, representatives of the Australian and New Zealand Corriedale Associatons, Sheep Improvement Limited (NZ) (SIL) and sheep Genetics Australia (SGA) met to discuss a collaborative project to explore development of a Trans-Tasman Corriedale genetic evaluation.

All parties agreed that a technical feasibility study was the first step required.

The technical study, undertaken by SIL and SGA, will complete a number of steps.

- Produce detailed data summaries of the Australian and NZ Corriedale pedigree and performance data sets held by SGA and SIL, which will provide an overview of the data available for analysis enabling a review of its likely fit into each analysis system.
- Generate a list of sires used in both the Australian and New Zealand Corriedale databases and ensure appropriate common IDs for those sires that have progeny in both data sets.
- Define a set of traits likely to be similar/same for the two data sets.
- Produce data sets that can be analysed by both the SIL an SGA.
- Run within and across country evaluations.

From these analyses the SIL-SGA team will produce a research report on the technical feasibility of conducting a combined Australia-New Zealand Corriedale genetic evaluation.

A positive outcome from the technical study will then enable the Australian and New Zealand Corriedale Associations to discuss and develop agreement on mutually beneficial ways to analyse and report breeding values using data from both Australian and NZ breeders.

The underling benefit to all Corriedale breeders is a larger group of animals with comparative objective information which increases opportunities to identify flock improving genetics for both Australian and New Zealand breeders.
