

A word from your president – Graham Jenke

It was good to catch up with many of you at the recent Bendigo Show. To all of you who were involved in showing or helping out, thank you on behalf of the ACA, and congratulations to all prize winners. However, I think it's not all about winning, it is also about participating, the social interaction and learning from others. The presentation of your sheep continues to improve, putting the pressure on us older stud exhibitors.

This all looks well for a good display at Bendigo next year when we will have many overseas visitors for the world congress watching the judging and looking at sheep.

It was good to see many of you competing in the judging and show sheep. It is a good way to learn more about the Corriedale breed. Whilst thinking about the Corriedale breed I feel it would be good to look at the type of sheep we are aiming to produce. We need to bear in mind that the Corriedale is a dual-purpose breed, 50% carcase and 50% wool. It is no good for the Corriedale breed if we have a big carcase sheep but with poor wool, and vice versa, an exceptional wool sheep but lacking carcase. That's what makes Corriedales a challenge to breed. No matter what we show, we need to aim to breed a sheep that has high commercial value for the sheep industry.

I believe the Corriedale sheep should sit between the Merino and the Crossbreeds, having the attributes of both wool and meat with the added advantage of being self-replacing.

An example of this was when \$6,500 was paid for a Corriedale ram from the Blackwood stud, purchased by 2 Merino breeders who in recent years have been introducing Corriedales into their Merino flocks to improve carcase and constitution.

Also, Sweetfield stud took out both the Supreme Champion Longwool Ewe and Ram at Hamilton Sheepvention in recognition of the dual-purpose attributes of both meat and wool of Corriedales.

As many of you know, I am always open to having a chat and hearing your thoughts. When my wife asks me "where have you been?" I say "I've been networking!" Graham G Jenke

Royal Adelaide Show: Junior Handling

The Adelaide Show is a great place to be if you are a young person interested in the sheep industry. As well as all the breeds and the people and the networking that you can be a part of, there are also junior judging and young handler competitions to be a part of. In the junior judging, there are classes for long wool and short wool breeds and different age groups up to 25 with the top placed SA participant going on to the national competition. The Junior Handler competition is broken into two age groups, 10-12 and 13-15, and you can take your own sheep out and you are assessed on how you position yourself and your sheep, your control of the sheep and how you present yourself. The judges have even been known to ask participants to swap sheep so that they can see how the handlers get on with an unfamiliar animal. This year, Zoe won the 10-12 age group while Nathan just missed out in the older group, but it all helps them when it comes to presenting their own sheep at shows.

Appropriate Show Attire

When showing your sheep, you have put a lot of effort into the preparation and presentation of the animal, it is important to reflect this image through your own attire. Presenting yourself well shows your commitment to being a handler of that animal and can make you more impressive to the judge when in the show ring. Much like you might dress up for a job interview, good personal presentation is also a sign of respect to the judge, other exhibitors and the public, that you value what you're doing and the opportunity to present your sheep. With the World Corriedale Conference happening in conjunction with the Australian Sheep and Wool Show in 2018, it's a great time to think about how we can really show ourselves and our sheep off to the world! Therefore, we thought it might be helpful to give our Corriedale Youth members some guidance on what is considered appropriate to wear while showing your sheep, so you can parade yourself and your animals with confidence.

Pants: With everything you wear, neatness is the key; long pants (preferably moleskins or otherwise plain, dark coloured jeans) should be clean and tidy, and free of rips and other 'fashion details', worn with or without a belt. At summer shows, it is much preferable to wear these pants during judging and change into cooler clothing once classes have finished. Often light coloured moleskins are as comfortable if not cooler than shorts.

Shirt: Each school or stud may have a different shirt as part of their showing attire, ideally, they should be long sleeve button up shirts or similar, but whatever you choose, they should be clean and ironed. We do understand that students do have to wear the same shirt a few days in a row for some shows however they should still look neat and tidy each day. Packing a clothes hanger in your bag to hang your shirt on overnight can be helpful. Shirts should always be tucked in when in the show ring.

Hair: Few things are more distracting as a handler than to have to frequently brush the hair out of your face and eyes! To allow you to completely focus on your animal in the ring, and keep your hair out of your way, girls should have their hair neatly tied back out of their face, with a ribbon if you wish. Boys should also have their hair neat and tidy and out of their face.

Boots: It always looks good to have boots that are freshly polished and don't look like they have just come out of the paddock. Polishing boots is something can be done the night before showing, if you talk amongst your stud/school team you could probably quite easily put together a cleaning and polishing kit for everyone to use. - Like all of these tips on personal presentation it highlights that as well as being prepared to put a lot of your time into trimming your sheep you are also prepared to put that time into your own personal development and presentation to make sure you parade confidently as a team.

We'll see you in the show ring, and good luck!
