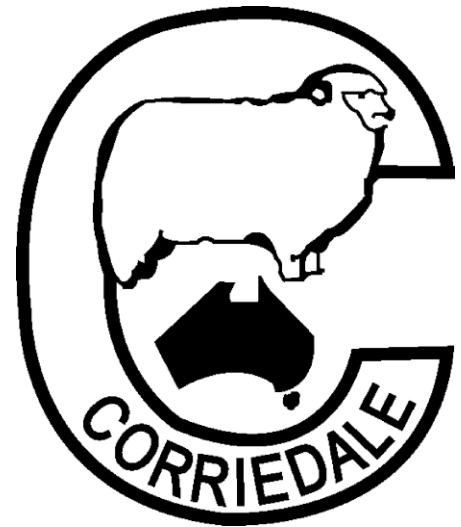

“Late in April I travelled to Adelaide to participate in the South Australian Sheep Expo 2017.

When we arrived at the showgrounds we were split into age groups, the Juniors were partnered with a Senior buddy to help us throughout the expo. Everyone was allocated a sheep of their own, to feed and handle for the duration of the camp.

We participated in many workshops over the three days, learning about everything from wool classing to auctioneering. I personally enjoyed the hands-on sessions, including AI and pregnancy scanning. I learnt so much and it was great to be able to talk to breeders from a different state and to hear about their history in the industry.

It was a great opportunity to socialise and get to know other young breeders from around Australia. We heard some great speeches from multiple people who came to talk to us about future careers, the importance of certain jobs and the roles they play in the industry.

On the last day, we competed in Handling classes, showing the judge that we had created a bond with our animal and had calmed it enough to be about to walk and show it. It was great to see the amount of work everyone had put into preparing their sheep, and how far they had come from day one. I placed first in my handling class, which was kindly sponsored by Landmark.

Over the three days, every session that we took part in had a small quiz or assessment. We were also given points for how tidy we kept our stalls and making sure we were dressed appropriately at all times. On the last day, our scores were added up and a highest achiever was awarded for each age group. Standing among some amazing young people, I won the Junior Champion Highest Achiever.

I made so many friends and learnt so much from the people around me, and I congratulate everyone who went. To those who didn't attend this year, I highly recommend going next year because you will learn so much through hands-on experiences and will come home feeling much more confident!

All exhibitors that are intending to show rams or ewes that are under the age of 1 ½ years of age, all rams from 1 ½ to 2 ½ years old and LAMBPLAN rams need to send wool samples to Daryl McDonald. There has been a letter sent out to all those exhibiting regarding the dates. If you have any questions, please ask!

Scanning

Scanning will occur for all sheep under 1 ½ years old and will begin at 7am, Friday the 14th July, 2017.

Flock Returns

Flock returns are now overdue. If they have not been paid please do it as soon as possible. Remember, if they have not been paid this may have an impact on your ability to exhibit at the Australian Sheep and Wool Show and is at the discretion of the Australian Corriedale Association.

Corriedale Ties

Please be aware the Corriedale ties are available for purchase. They are Navy woollen ties with the Corriedale Logo. They are \$30 per tie and can be collected at the ASBA show. If you would like to order a tie please forward your cheque and order to the ACA head office. Again if you have any questions about this please send me an email.

AUSTRALIAN CORRIEDALE ASSOCIATION YOUNG AMBASSADOR PROGRAMME

This year the Young Ambassador Award will be held at the Adelaide Show in September. It is for young people involved in the production of the breed aged between 19 and 25 years old. There will be two representatives chosen from each state through a selection process that is outlined below. APPROPRIATE SHOW ATTIRE

When showing your sheep, you have put a lot of effort into the preparation and presentation of the animal, it is important to reflect this image through your own attire. Presenting yourself well shows your commitment to being a handler of that animal and can make you more impressive to the judge when in the show ring. Much like you might dress up for a job interview, good personal presentation is also a sign of respect to the judge, other exhibitors and the public, that you value what you're doing and the opportunity to present your sheep. With the World Corriedale Congress happening in conjunction with the Australian Sheep and Wool Show in 2018, it's a great time to think about how we can really show ourselves and our sheep off to the world! Therefore, we thought it might be helpful to give our Corriedale Youth members some guidance on what is considered appropriate to wear while showing your sheep, so you can parade yourself and your animals with confidence.

Pants: With everything you wear, neatness is the key; long pants (preferably moleskins or otherwise plain, dark coloured jeans) should be clean and tidy, and free of rips and other 'fashion details', worn with or without a belt. At summer shows, it is much preferable to wear these pants during judging and change into cooler clothing once classes have finished. Often light coloured moleskins are as comfortable if not cooler than shorts.

Shirt: Each school or stud may have a different shirt as part of their showing attire, ideally, they should be long sleeve button up shirts or similar, but whatever you choose, they should be clean and ironed. We do understand that students do have to wear the same shirt a few days in a row for some shows however they should still look neat and tidy each day. Packing a clothes hanger in your bag to hang your shirt on overnight can be helpful. Shirts should always be tucked in when in the show ring. If you are required or choose to wear a tie, ensure that it is worn appropriately as they are there to presentable and professional and not wearing appropriately can have the opposite effect.

Hair: Few things are more distracting as a handler than to have to frequently brush the hair out of your face and eyes! To allow you to completely focus on your animal in the ring, and keep your hair out of your way, girls should have their hair neatly tied back out of their face, with a ribbon if you wish. Boys should also have their hair neat and tidy and out of their face.

Boots: It always looks good to have boots that are freshly polished and don't look like they have just come out of the paddock. Polishing boots is something can be done the night before showing, if you talk amongst your stud/school team you could probably quite easily put together a cleaning and polishing kit for everyone to use. - Like all of these tips on personal presentation it highlights that as well as being prepared to put a lot of your time into trimming your sheep you are also prepared to

put that time into your own personal development and presentation to make sure you parade confidently as a team.

We'll see you in the show ring, and good luck!

CORRIEDALE YOUNG AMBASSADOR PROGRAMME 2017.

The Australian Corriedale Association (ACA) invites young people involved in the production of Corriedale sheep to consider nominating for the ACA Young Ambassador Programme (YAP). This programme seeks to encourage young people involved in the breeding of Corriedales, both commercial and studs, by giving them the opportunity to make connections within the sheep industry on both sides of the Tasman Sea.

The YAP is a combined initiative of the Australian and New Zealand Corriedale groups. In alternate years, each will host or send an ambassador across the Tasman. For the person selected as Australia's Young Ambassador, they will be awarded the chance to go to New Zealand for approximately 10 days, coinciding with the Christchurch Show in mid November 2017. Return flights will be paid for by the ACA (or another sponsor) and the New Zealand Corriedale Society will host them for their stay. If, for unforeseen circumstances, the selected ambassador is unable to make the trip to NZ in November, the runner up will be asked to go in their place.

The responsibilities of the Young Ambassador include:

1. Be willing to represent the ACA as a young ambassador for the term of their appointment.
2. Be asked to report with a written submission to the ACA newsletter and also may be asked for a verbal presentation.
3. If possible be involved in the hosting of the New Zealand young ambassador, helping to build networks for the future. This will be rotated around the states.
4. Be involved in the selection of the next young ambassador for the ACA in two years time.

Nominees for the YAP need to be aged from 19 to 25 years old as at Bendigo ASBA show in July 2017. The national selection will take place at the Royal Adelaide Show, Friday 1st and Saturday 2nd September 2017. Nominees need to be able to attend this show for judging, and be available in November to travel to New Zealand.

Candidates chosen to represent their state at the national selections will be assessed on four criteria, each contributing 25% to the final score. These criteria are:

1. A written resume, detailing the candidate's background in study, work, farming and community involvement, their present involvement and their ambitions for the future.
2. A brief (less than 5 minutes) verbal presentation at the South Australian Corriedale Dinner on Friday evening. The topic of this presentation is to be of the candidates own choosing, not their resume but could be related to agriculture in general, future directions for the sheep industry, their interest in Corriedales or their thoughts on a topical issue.
3. An interview with a panel of judges (Saturday).
4. A sheep judging competition (including verbal reasoning) on Saturday. Candidates will be advised of times for the interview and sheep judging.

Presentations will be made shortly after the judging competition.

If you wish to nominate for the YAP, please fill in the details below and submit them to **your state branch secretary**. Each state has the capacity to select up to **two** candidates to represent them at the National selections. If necessary, State committees are welcome to use the national judging criteria to assist them in their selection of their candidates. Names and resumes of candidates nominated by each state need to be forwarded to the South Australian secretary by 11th August
