

On Wednesday, April 18, youth from all over Australia descended on the Adelaide showgrounds for the 3rd annual South Australian Sheep Expo. The main focus was on the ram. We looked at ways to market rams for sales, how to select a good commercial ram, different breeds and history of the breeds. Nutrition was very informative for all groups as we learnt about the different feeds a ram should be having to get the longevity from them. In ram health we learnt how to check a ram over and where you want them to be in the weeks leading up to joining. In ram health we also got the opportunity to look at healthy semen which was a very interesting experience for all. Genetics and Ram Select were very interesting as we learnt about how to read ASBVs and different traits and their heritability. In wool we looked at wool when on the sheep and wool once it's off the sheep and the processes it goes through to become the clothing we wear. One of the most interactive sessions was the low stress sheep handling. We learnt about the 4 basic instincts sheep have and how we must be aware of those instincts when working sheep. One of our final sessions was with horse trainer Tom Wiloughy who gave us a very inspirational talk about how to not give up and to persevere towards your goals. Overall the entire experience was very knowledgeable and great fun. Many new friendships were formed and much more knowledge was gained. I'd highly recommend the expo to anyone who wants to work with sheep. Hope to see you all next year when we look at Lambs and Technology.

Appropriate Show Attire

When showing your sheep, you have put a lot of effort into the preparation and presentation of the animal, it is important to reflect this image through your own attire. Presenting yourself well shows your commitment to being a handler of that animal and can make you more impressive to the judge when in the show ring. Much like you might dress up for a job interview, good personal presentation is also a sign of respect to the judge, other exhibitors and the public, that you value what you're doing and the opportunity to present your sheep. With the World Corriedale Conference happening in conjunction with the Australian Sheep and Wool Show in 2018, it's a great time to think about how we can really show ourselves and our sheep off to the world! Therefore, we thought it might be helpful to give our Corriedale Youth members some guidance on what is considered appropriate to wear while showing your sheep, so you can parade yourself and your animals with confidence.

Pants: With everything you wear, neatness is the key; long pants (preferably moleskins or otherwise plain, dark coloured jeans) should be clean and tidy, and free of rips and other 'fashion details', worn with or without a belt. At summer shows, it is much preferable to wear these pants during judging and change into cooler clothing once classes have finished. Often light coloured moleskins are as comfortable if not cooler than shorts.

Shirt: Each school or stud may have a different shirt as part of their showing attire, ideally, they should be long sleeve button up shirts or similar, but whatever you choose, they should be clean and ironed. We do understand that students do have to wear the same shirt a few days in a row for some shows however they should still look neat and tidy each day. Packing a clothes hanger in your bag to hang your shirt on overnight can be helpful. Shirts should always be tucked in when in the show ring.

Hair: Few things are more distracting as a handler than to have to frequently brush the hair out of your face and eyes! To allow you to completely focus on your animal in the ring, and keep your hair out of your way, girls should have their hair neatly tied back out of their face, with a ribbon if you wish. Boys should also have their hair neat and tidy and out of their face.

Boots: It always looks good to have boots that are freshly polished and don't look like they have just come out of the paddock. Polishing boots is something can be done the night before showing, if you talk amongst your stud/school team you could probably quite easily put together a cleaning and polishing kit for everyone to use. - Like all of these tips on personal presentation it highlights that as well as being prepared to put a lot of your time into trimming your sheep you are also prepared to put that time into your own personal development and presentation to make sure you parade confidently as a team.

We'll see you in the show ring, and good luck!
